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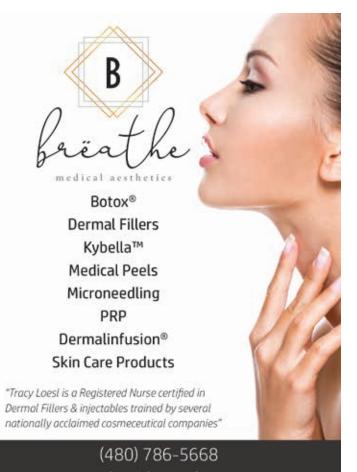

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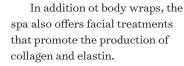

A teen having a job can be both challenging and rewarding. For a teen, it's an opportunity for independence, a chance to have their own money that they've earned. For parents, it means that your child no longer has to ask you for money for everything. But, how do you know if your teen is ready for a job? Here are four key things to look for that let you know if your child is ready for their first

How well to they manage their time? One of the most fundamental parts of having a job is being able to be on time every day they are scheduled. Being on time is a way of showing respect to co-workers and their boss. Also, your teen needs to be able to have a balance between being able to get all of their schoolwork completed, spend time with friends and family, any extra-curricular activities and their job. If your teen spends a lot of time doing things on the fly or at the last second, they might not

How are their communication skills? Being able to reasonably communicate with co-workers, bosses and customers is often a key aspect of a first job. If you have a teen who is often quiet or is introverted, that doesn't mean that they shouldn't try out a first job. In fact, them having a job might be the best thing for them. Going on some interviews and then having to be communicative at work could really help break your teen out of their shell.

Can they distinguish what's appropriate in different situations? Does your teen know how to dress for different situations? Are they generally respectful to adults? Can they be friendly and calm even if they are in a bad mood? These skills are all about being professional at work, even on tough days. An easy way to assess this skill is to look at how your teen approaches school. A teen who can do assignments even if they don't like a subject or a teacher is likely more ready for a first job. Also, do they wear appropriate clothing to school? Many teens these days roll into school with pajama-looking pants and a sweatshirt, and that's okay. They are dressing similar to their peers. But, if your teen often wears outfits that don't match or just plain doesn't care about their appearance, they may not be ready for a job just yet.

Can they be a team player? Most jobs, especially first jobs, require a lot of teamwork. Your teen doesn't have to like everyone they work with, but they do have to get along with them. Also, they might not like their boss, but they do have to be able to take direction from them. A good way to assess if your teen is ready for a job is to see how they do working in groups. If they can be both a leader and be willing to take directions from someone else, they have a good chance of being successful in a job.

Not having one or two of these skills doesn't mean that your teen isn't ready for a job. The key is to look at your teen overall and help them develop any skills they may need. Being a new employee can be a great thing for your teen, and it can also be a daunting task. But, with some guidance your teen can be a successful member of the workforce.

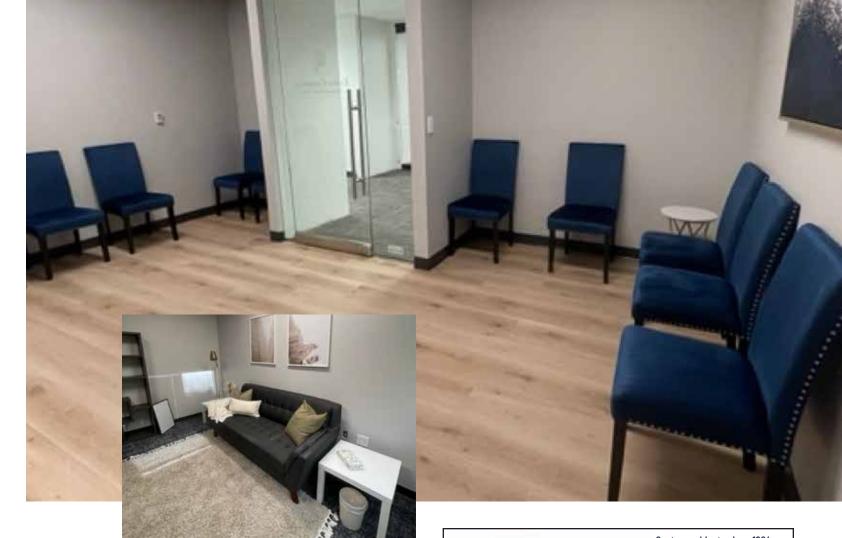

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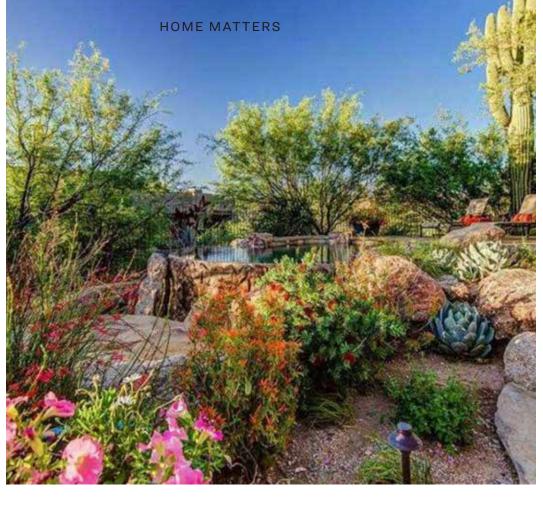
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Spring Gardening Trends for 2023

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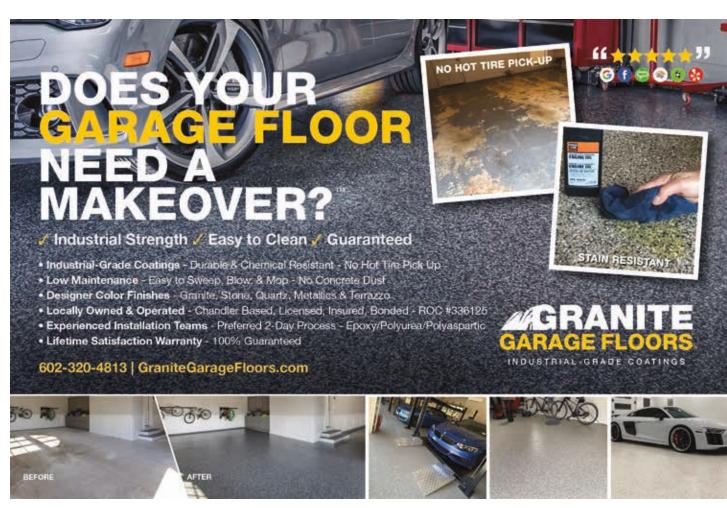

The Glennens' dream kitchen

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Homeowners Keith and Jennie Glennen focused their kitchen remodel on creating a beautiful and timeless look with an efficient design and open floor plan.

The kitchen boasts a large footprint in their nearly 3,000-square-foot Chandler home, but the previous remodel from the early 2000s had become dated. The Glennens chose to work with Regal Bath & Kitchens to open up the space for hosting large gatherings but at the same time did not want to lose their cozy and comfortable feel for the family's everyday living. "When we look at our kitchen, we are so happy with every single thing about it. There's nothing that we would change," says Jennie Glennen.

The changes from before and after are significant. The original kitchen did not include a pantry, so Regal creatively added one where there used to be a hallway. into the family room. The space feels bigger with taller Procraft Milania cabinets, additional lighting in some cabinetry, and boasts custom shelving and wine storage. The backsplash is both visually interesting and bright with Reverie Decor and Splash Ivory.

Crepes. Pancakes. Pannekoeken. Three variations of a simple breakfast treat. Whether super thin like a crepe or a little fluffier like the traditional American pancake, this breakfast treat is simple to make and a whole lot of delicious to eat. Although 3rd-generation Arizona native Devoney Kelash may have tacos in her blood, having been married to a Minnesota native for two decades, she has become a convert to some dishes with northern European roots.

Pannekoeken, or Pannekoek, is a traditional Dutch dish that people may also know as the Dutch baby pancake. This recipe, while similar, does have one main difference – the pan. "I was first introduced to this when we were visiting Dennis' (her husband) family in Minnesota. Once I tasted it, I knew this would become a favorite," she said.

One funny story about this dish is that her husband's family calls it Hootenanny, not Pannekoeken. "My husband is Polish and his paternal grandparents would make this for breakfast every time he slept over or visited ever since he can remember. His grandfather Don Kelash in MN called it Hootenanny. He was always making up fun names for dishes, so the name stuck," she recalled.

Because this recipe is fast and easy, it is frequently on the menu when kids Cater and Brody have friends sleep over or when guests come in from out of town. "This really is a crowdpleaser because you can customize the topping to whatever your tastes, from sweet to savory."

So be it Dutch pancakes, Pannekoeken, or Hootenanny, just be sure when you make this to leave the oven light on to see the deliciousness unfold.

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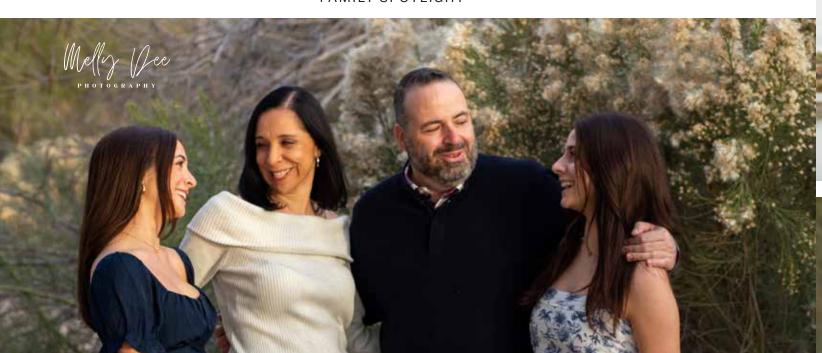

Taleen Carpenter, the Lodge's outgoing Exalted Ruler, tells *Stroll Chandler Ocotillo*, "If you have a caring, giving spirit, this is a place you want to be. It's a place of friendship and camaraderie with the opportunity to make a big impact on our community. And we have a great time!"

Taleen grew up in a family of Elks Lodge members. She remembers accompanying her grandfather to meetings in Flagstaff when she was a little girl. She would help clean up, play on the lodge's pinball machine, and learn about community service. She even attended the father-daughter dance with her grandfather. She is proud to say, "We have over 102 years of Elks service in my family. In addition to my grandfather, my mom, my brother, my husband, and even my sons are Elks members."

The Chandler Elks Lodge #2429 is part of a nationwide network of Elks. There are more than 2,000 lodges nationally, and together they contribute \$80 million a year to children and veterans.

In Chandler, there are three main auxiliaries: the Elks Veterans Committee, the Elk Riders, and the Elks Ladies.

The Veterans Committee concentrates on delivering Welcome Home Baskets to veterans who are transitioning from homelessness. They also joined forces with the Mesa Buckhorn Lodge to open the Food Pantry for Valor on 8th in Tempe, which opens its doors on the last Saturday of each month to provide ready-to-go meals, diapers, shampoo and other items for veteran families who may require extra assistance at the end of the month.

Chandler is known for their Elks Riders Club. Members ride their motorcycles to venues around the state delivering hope. Recently, the group made a stop at Shumway Elementary School and delivered a check for \$450 to cover the costs of unpaid student lunches.

The Elks Ladies host a multitude of social events to raise money for the well-being of the lodge and to assist anyone in need.

Every December, the Chandler Elks Lodge #2429 partners with Boys & Girls Clubs of the Valley - Chandler to provide Christmas gifts and breakfast. The JCPenney at Superstition Mall opens early for Elk members to shop for clothing, socks, shoes and coats for kids. At 9 am, the Lodge hosts breakfast for the children: frying up eggs and bacon, making toast, serving orange juice and more. They also gave 2,000 coloring books to promote drug awareness and sponsored an essay-writing contest for middle and high school students. Winners were honored at their Annual Youth Awards Banquet.

Teaching from the heart

nince she was six years old, Kathy Bohling wanted to be a teacher. The Bogle Junior High School Media Specialist tells Stroll Chandler Ocotillo, "My first-grade teacher was tall and pretty and had perfect handwriting. I wanted to be just like her. When I was in high school, I decided I wanted to work with junior high kids."

Kathy began her teaching career at Annunciata School in Chicago and Wilbur Wright Middle School in Munster, Indiana. She moved to Arizona in 2001 and began teaching English Language Arts and Social Studies at Bogle Junior High School. In 2009, she became the school's media specialist. She says, "Bogle has been my home for almost 22 years. Our student demographics mirror those of Chandler, so I love the diversity. The staff at Bogle is amazing! They consistently focus on doing what's best for students. We have a strong sense of tradition and pride at Bogle, as well."

To keep current, Kathy reads over 75 books a year. She explains, "Junior high students often struggle to figure out who they are. My main goal in the library is to make sure I know just the right book to recommend to students, no matter what they like." She continues saying, "If a student tells me they don't like to read, my response is always, 'You just haven't found the right book!""

Kathy recalls a particularly quiet student who checked out a book and read it in one day. When he returned the book, he told Kathy he loved the story, and after a pause, thanked her for making books like that available. Another reluctant student-reader refused every recommendation Kathy gave him until one day he begrudgingly picked out a book. He came back to the library a few days later to return it and ended up reading the entire 12-book series. Kathy exclaims, "Anyone can be a reader! That's why I do this job!"

Kathy began volunteering with the Aris Foundation, an organization serving individuals experiencing homelessness, in December 2020 after a former student who became homeless passed away. She started a mobile library for their Tuesday night outreach events in Tempe and regularly collects clothes, shoes, bags, blankets, and toiletries from family and friends to assist the organization. She also collects bikes and books from those who no longer need them and gives them to deserving individuals who can use them. For the past year, she has also taken breakfast with a carload of donations to several homeless camps in Central Phoenix on Saturday mornings. She says volunteering has become a huge part of her life.

When asked for three adjectives that describe her, Kathy laughs, saying they are the same today as they were 22 years ago, "Responsible, because I am often the go-to person on campus to get things done. Willing, because I will take on whatever role is necessary to do what's best for the school and the community I live in. And loyal, because very few people love Bogle Junior High more than I do. I am a Bulldog!"

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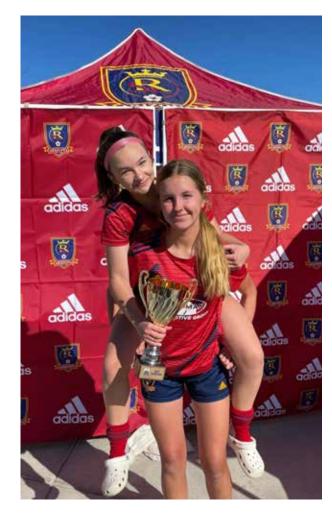
Ella Bruening

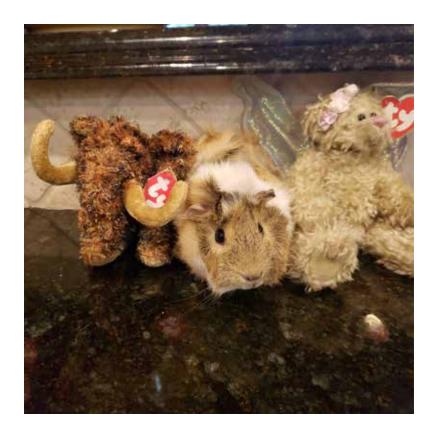

The 529 plan is a tax-advantaged path to a brighter academic future.

Their next steps might include a gap year and travel, joining the military or attending college, each option with its own financial considerations. According to Forbes, higher education is the most expensive it's ever been: \$27,330 per year for in-state tuition on average. Thinking about how you're going to pay for college down the road? WHAT IS A 529 PLAN?

A 529 plan is a tax-advantaged education savings plan intended to cover expenses associated with college and, in some cases, K-12 tuition and apprenticeships. Rules for 529 plans vary by state.

ADVANTAGES

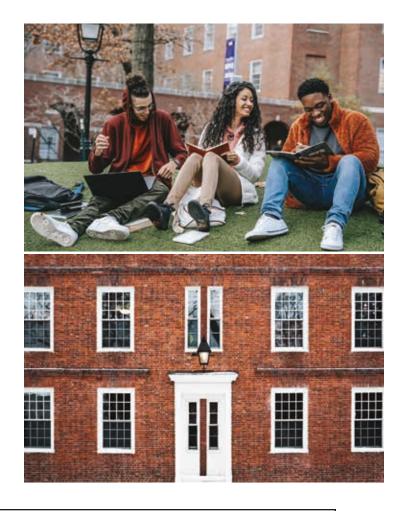
There's a lot to like about saving for education expenses with

a 529 plan. First, they can be used for an array of qualified education-related expenditures, including tuition, fees, room and board, books and supplies. They are excluded from state and federal taxes, and many states even offer a state income tax deduction or tax credit for 529 plan contributions.

DISADVANTAGES

On the other hand, some shortcomings to 529 plans do exist. Funds must be used for qualified education expenses, which means that non-qualified distributions, such as for transportation, applications and testing, and sports fees, for example, are subject to income tax and a 10% penalty.

529 plans are an attractive choice when planning for students' educational future, with pros and cons that must be weighed carefully by each family. Happy saving!

\$HOW **METHF** MONEY

Congratulations! You went to court and received a judgment to be paid to you by the opposing party whether that was for real property, personal property, reimbursements, breach of contract, or attorney's fees and costs. Now what?

I often find myself in the position of explaining to clients that money judgments are not self-enforcing orders; meaning that the party awarded the judgment must take action to ensure that they are paid. Quite often individuals are unaware that they have a limited time to take action to collect upon their judgment - whether it be for retroactive child support or a judgment awarded for breach of contract. Failure to act and/or to renew the judgment in the statutory timeframe will ultimately result in extinguishment of the judgment or \$0 owed by the debtor.

In family court, some awards of fees may be contemptible, meaning that the family court may have jurisdiction to enter additional orders on the other party's failure to pay the judgment owed. This is especially true with respect to awards of support monies and sometimes attorney's fees and costs. In this instance, you may have the option of filing an action for contempt and/or enforcement and may be entitled to discovery of the debtor's financial circumstances via bank statements or other documentation.

For other judgment awards, you may have to consider other avenues, such as filing liens on real property or garnishing wages.

And, if all of this isn't complicated enough, you must also be prepared to address any bankruptcy case that may be filed by the debtor prior to receipt of payment of the full amount of the judgment.
